EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Established in 1869, the Van Wert Fire Department has been serving the community for 154 years. With a dedicated crew of eighteen firefighter/EMTs and a consistent fire chief for nearly fifty years, the department currently operates with 18 on-duty firefighters, 10 reserves, all under the leadership of the Fire Chief. Remarkably, the department has maintained the same personnel levels for the past fifty years.

Serving a city population of 11,063 (US Census Bureau 2022), the department also contracts with Pleasant Township to extend fire and EMS services to 5.9 sections outside the city limits. The response area covers 14 square miles, and the department acts as the sole full-time staffed Advanced Life Support Ambulance for the entire county, spanning 410 square miles.

Functioning as a suburban/rural all-hazard fire department, the Van Wert Fire Department extends professional services encompassing firefighting, specialized rescue (including hazard-ous materials response, high/low angle rescue, confined space rescue, trench rescue, structural collapse response, ice rescue, water rescue, grain bin rescue), mass casualty response, emergency medical services, fire prevention, and conducts annual fire safety inspections.

In 2023, the department responded to 2,121 calls for service, reflecting a decrease from 2022. Operating under a mutual aid agreement with all county departments, the Van Wert Fire Department provided 96 calls for aid in 2022, receiving aid two times during the same period.




FROM THE FIRE CHIEF











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

INCIDENT TYPES













FIRE INCIDENTS

In the year 2023, the Van Wert Fire Department demonstrated unwavering commitment and efficiency in addressing fire incidents within our community. Responding to a total of 25 structure fires, our dedicated team successfully contained these incidents, mitigating potential devastation.

These efforts translated into a commendable achievement of saving an estimated \$677,770.00 worth of property, with property damages amounting to \$136,700. The pre-incident property values stood at \$814,470.00, emphasizing the significant impact our department had in preserving the community's assets.

Despite the challenges presented, our department prioritized public safety, resulting in one civilian injury and no reportable injuries to our brave firefighters. Our commitment to excellence is further underscored by our average turnout time (Dispatch to En-route for all incidents) of 2:54, showcasing our swift and decisive response to emergent and non-emergent situations.

For fire calls, our average response time (Dispatch to Arrival) was 7:16, encompassing both city and out-of-town Mutual aid responses. This comprehensive approach ensures that our community receives timely assistance, regardless of the location or nature of the incident.

Throughout the year, the Van Wert Fire Department handled a total of 207 fire calls, addressing diverse situations such as motor vehicle accidents with entrapment, rescues, gas leaks, and false alarms. Our adaptability and readiness to tackle various challenges demonstrate our commitment to serving the community beyond traditional fire incidents.

As we reflect on the accomplishments of 2023, it is evident that the Van Wert Fire Department remains steadfast in its mission to protect lives and property. Our unwavering dedication, coupled with effective response strategies, positions us as a reliable force in safeguarding the well-being of our community.

COMMUNITY RISK REDUCTION

Inspections Conducted: A total of 148 inspections were successfully completed by the Community Risk Reduction department in 2023

Violation Instances: During the inspection process, 171 violations were identified and documented for further action and resolution.

Average Inspection Time: The average time taken for each inspection was approximately 44 minutes and 45 seconds, reflecting thoroughness and efficiency in the evaluation process.

Conclusion: The fire department lieutenants effectively lead the Community Risk Reduction bureau, which falls under the authority of the Fire Chief. Despite the daily demands of emergency responses and other job requirements, our team has demonstrated dedication in conducting inspections and addressing violations promptly. This commitment is Instrumental in identifying and addressing potential risks within 590-Occupancies, contributing to the overall safety of our community. Looking forward to 2024, our goals include completing inspections for 25% of our 590 occupancies and increasing our presence in community schools to enhance fire safety awareness among students and staff. This proactive approach aims to foster a culture of fire prevention and preparedness, ultimately reducing the likelihood of fire incidents and ensuring the safety of our community members.

APPARATUS

The Van Wert Fire Department diligently maintains a diverse fleet of apparatus and equipment, ensuring readiness and reliability. Our inventory includes:

- 3 Engines Rescues (pumpers): These units are prepared to respond to fires with precision and power.
- 2 Ladders (aerials): Providing essential access and rescue capabilities.
- 1 Tanker: Critical for firefighting in areas without hydrant access.
- 3 Advanced Life Support Ambulances (medics): Equipped with advanced life-saving equipment for swift and effective patient care delivery.
- 1 Grass Engine: Tailored for combating field fires, essential for rural firefighting.
- 4 staff vehicles: Supporting the needs of our Chief, Officers, utility requirements, and educational outreach.
- 1 Boat: Essential for water-based rescue operations.
- 1 Hazmat/Confined Space Rescue Trailer: Equipped to handle hazardous materials incidents and confined space rescues.
- 1 ATV: Facilitating access to remote and challenging terrain.
- 1 Fire Prevention Trailer: Mobilizing educational efforts to promote fire safety and prevention.

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The department maintains our fleet with annual services, along with personnel keeping the apparatus looking like new. Despite the challenges faced, our fleet maintains an average combined age of 16.4 years for our front-line apparatus. The department is currently awaiting the delivery of a new engine, scheduled for the second quarter of 2025, to replace E3. Additionally, plans are underway to order a new ambulance in 2024 from our local Ambulance company Braun, with an estimated delivery in 2026. These updates ensure our fleet remains modern and capable of meeting the evolving needs of our community. Each vehicle and piece of equipment plays a vital role in our mission to safeguard and serve the community. Here's a breakdown of our apparatus:
